## DAY 1

## 1. Story time

Read the Hamilton Group Reader Superheroes - All Sorts.

The story says that ordinary people can be superheroes every bit as much as people like Batman or Superman. Do <u>you</u> know any everyday superheroes? What makes them a hero? (You might like to think of some of the people who have been carrying on their jobs while most of us stay safe at home — NHS workers, Postal workers, Shop workers and so on.)

## 2. Writing about 'everyday superheroes

Can you think of and choose an everyday superhero, like those mentioned in the story? Can you draw a picture of your 'everyday superhero' and write sentences to say why that person is a superhero? You could use adjectives to write descriptive sentences about your chosen superhero. Make sure to include a sentence saying WHY that person is a superhero to you. Have a look at the example below. If you can, you could show your 'everyday superhero' your work so that they know that you appreciate them.

My everyday superhero is my dad <u>because</u> he is a policeman. He has black <u>and</u> short hair and brown eyes. He is very tall <u>and</u> has glasses. My dad is a superhero <u>because</u> he goes to work every day. He has been keeping people safe during lockdown.

Check that you have included all of these things:

- A capital letter at the start of a sentence (and for a name)
- Finger spaces between each word.
- A full stop at the end of your sentence.
- Adjectives to describe.
- Joining your ideas with 'and'
- Using 'because' to explain why.
